The common way of relating in Western Cultures. Familiar, Efficient, but unstable.


Truth Sub-System


- * 1 truth (master's)
- * 1 reality (master's)
- * Facts (the master's)
- * Correctness (master's)
- * Agreement with the master.
- * Silence from slave.

Punishment System

for non-compliance, expressed-disagreement.

- * Push the Slave Down: shame, ridicule, mock, demote, degrade, devalue.
- * Push the Slave Out: abandon, dismiss, fire, evict, divorce.





Summary

- Familiar
- Ideal for the impatient
- Pretend -Truth/Clarity
- Pretend-Agreement
- Low-anxiety for Master only
- Illusion of being in control for Master only
- Irresponsibility for Slave
- Enmeshed boundaries
- Unstable, falls apart

Democratic / Dialogical Relationships 1Person-1Vote

Unfamiliar, Inefficient, but stable.



Summary

- Very inefficient, slow
- Requires the skill of patience
- No truth! Multiple truths.
- Sharing Differences
- Dialogical*
- Safe for all
- Shared control
- All people are responsible all the time
- PreValidation
- Requires boundary skills
- Very reliable in the long-term
